2012 Agronomy Conference and Seed Symposium


Our annual conference will be held co-jointly with the "Seeds - Realising their Potential" Symposium at Lincoln University, Canterbury from November 20-22.

Recognising the contribution of Assoc. Prof. George Hill



Associate Professor George Hill recently stepped down from his role on the Agronomy Council after a 37-year association with the Society. George was first elected onto the Council in 1975, just four years after the Society was founded. During this time he has held various roles, including President, Secretary, Council member, Assistant Editor and Editor of the Proceedings. In 1996 George was elected as a Fellow of the Society.

During his nearly 40-years at Lincoln University George has had 35 Masters and PhD students and 12 Honours students. His students are employed all around the world as research scientists, academics and, in

at least one case, as a Vice-Chancellor. George has published 30 book chapters or books and well over 190 refereed scientific publications.


George held a wide range of roles at Lincoln University including Head of the Plant Science Department, Chair of Academic Assembly and Chair of the Board of Degree Studies in Science. He also worked as a Visiting Scientist at Wageningen, Visiting Professor at the University of Heidelburg, Visiting Scientist at Instituto Nacional de Investigación y Tecnología Agraria y Alimentaria, Madrid and at Auburn University, USA.

Kiwi cross-slot inventor nominated for Global Food Prize

Agricultural engineer Dr John Baker was recently nominated for the US\$250,000 World Food Prize for the cross-slot seed drill he pioneered and now supplies from his Feilding factory.

The drill creates two side-by-side pockets as it passes through the soil, placing seed in one and fertiliser in the other. By reducing soil disturbance less moisture is lost, soil carbon is retained and microbes can prosper.
