

Water specialist to address delegates at Conference



Water has emerged as the ‘issue of the day’ for most industries involved in the production of crops, especially as stakeholders respond to the National Policy Statement on Fresh Water Management. Unlocking the economic potential of water within accepted quality and quantity limits will be key to achieving sustainable growth in the NZ agricultural sector.

Water issues will be the topic of this year’s keynote address by Professor Bryan Jenkins. Jenkins is a professorial fellow at the Waterways Centre for Freshwater Management, a joint centre of the University of Canterbury and Lincoln University. Prior to this appointment he was chief executive of Environment Canterbury and before that the Department of Environmental Protection in Western Australia.

Agronomy Society ICSC award presented to Richard Sim



Past president Professor Bruce McKenzie recently presented Richard Sim with the Society's travel award to attend the 6th International Crop Science Congress in Brazil. The Congress was held in August, with scientists from around the world converging to discuss and debate topical issues facing the broader agricultural industry.

Richard is a PhD student at Lincoln University and presented his research on the growth, development and water extraction of Lucerne crops grown under different management.

Travel awards given to Lincoln and Massey students

Each year the Agronomy Society offers a travel award for student members presenting their research at our annual conference. This year, the award has been split between two successful applicants - Juliano Oliveira and Lawrent Pungulani.

Juliano (top) is a PhD student in the Agriculture and Life Science Department at Lincoln University and is quantifying the physiological age of potato seed and its impacts on growth and development of potato crops. Lawrent (bottom) is a PhD student in the Natural Resources Institute at Massey University and is exploring the genetic potential of cow pea germplasm for drought tolerance.

Juliano and Lawrent will present their papers on Day 1 of the conference.
