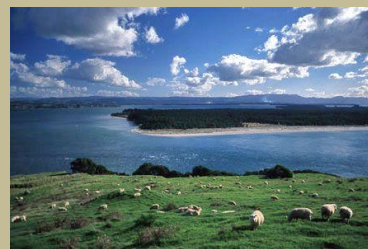

During this year's Agronomy Conference we will host an industry forum that covers a range of topical issues relating to maize grain and silage. Maize is a key crop that is grown widely in the BOP and nearby Waikato - largely for dairy support.

2012 Agronomy Conference a success

Last November we held our annual conference alongside the 'Seed Symposium' at Lincoln University. The event was attended by about 40 delegates, who heard of new developments in crop and seed research. Professor Brian Jenkin's of the Waterways Centre for Freshwater Management provided a timely keynote address on water issues in Canterbury ([click here for a copy of his keynote paper](#)).

Delegates also visited the Lincoln University biotron and lysimeter facilities, Plant & Food Research rainout shelter, Lincoln Dairy Farm, PGG Wrightson's Seed Distribution Centre, Grasslanz and AgResearch farms to see firsthand some of the trials and technologies being used to deliver profitable, sustainable and resilient farming businesses.

The best overall paper award went to Richard Chynoweth (*'Irrigation management of perennial ryegrass seed crops'*) and best student paper to Juliano Oliveira (*'Sprout development of seed potato tuber after different storage conditions'*).
